### Short Summary

Opening in 1974, Easley Winery is the oldest family-owned winery in the state of Indiana. Depending on the year and season, Easley offers more than 20 different wines and champagne. Located in the Cole-Noble Commercial Arts District in downtown Indianapolis, they destem, crush, press, ferment, clarify and bottle all wines right at the winery. Stop by for a wine tasting, attend a free concert, or take a weekend Grape to Glass tour!

### History

In 1974, Indianapolis attorney Jack Easley and his wife, Joan, bought a historic brick building at the corner of College Avenue and Ohio Street in downtown Indianapolis. That fall they crushed the first harvest of grapes from the vineyards they'd planted in 1971 along the Ohio River, creating the first Easley wines. Continuing their tradition today, second generation owners Mark and Meredith Easley are working diligently to bring great Indiana wines to the community.

Easley Winery is located in the Cole-Noble Commercial Arts District, just one half-mile east of Monument Circle in downtown Indianapolis. The corner of Ohio Street and N. College Avenue:
